School Council Trustee Report

May 2022

- May is budget deliberation month when we set our 2022-2023 school year budget; we deal with close to \$137 000 000 to cover all aspects of operations for the division; we expect to have to pull money out of our reserves to cover expenses this year.
- Our Attendance Area Review is proceeding according to set out timelines; we have completed our first round of consultations and we will be posting our results before entering our second round of stakeholder input; most decisions will not take effect until the 2023-2024 school year.
- We were disappointed to hear that the Alberta School Council Association has lost basically all provincial funding (used to receive about \$650 000 yearly). Coincidentally (or maybe not) the Minister of Education has set up her own Parent's Council made up of 40 handpicked members of public to provide stakeholder input.
- We will be hosting the Tri Me Triathlon this year after a 2 year absence due to Covid. This year's event will be held in Stony Plain.
- The minister has announced that K-6 subjects are ready for piloting for schools (some K-3 subjects are already mandatory for the 2022-2023 school year). We have not decided yet whether to pilot and what to pilot. Minister expects an answer by early June.

- École Broxton Park School Survey went out to all parents Apr 22, 2022 through the school messenger
 - Survey will help Administration facilitate Education planning for the next school year
 - Key points:
 - Overall very positive.
 - A No Cellphone in non-instructional periods rule will be implemented for elementary classes in 2022-2023. Administration and teachers will revisit the Jr.High cellphone rule.
 - Communication: Email, remind and facebook seemed to be the most preferable.

- ÉBPS 4-6 and 7-9 Track and Field Meets occurred May 9th and 10th.



- Monday Music Mania May 2nd was a great success! All performances were well attended and there was great feedback from families.
- Jump Rope for Heart for grades 1-6 takes place May 18th or May 19th, depending on class.
- PSD's 6th annual "Try-Me Try-Athlon" is back this year! It takes place in Stony Plain on June 3rd. For more information check the PSD website and to register your child, if interested.
- Marketplace is coming back! May 31, June 1st and 2nd
 - Grade 9 students are organizing food venues for the rest of the school population to raise money for their grade 9 farewell and year end event.
- Kindergarten Test Drive is scheduled for June 3rd and June 17th. This opportunity allows next year's registrants the chance to see what a day in French Immersion kindergarten looks like.
- Classlist and Staffing is underway for next year but should have those plans finalized by the end of the school year.
 - FI-PSAA students will be mixed in regular FI classlist rather than having a separate classroom. This will better facilitate for our FI-PSAA students to see themselves as being part of the FI community and more efficient timetabling.
- Preparing for the National Indigenous Peoples Day celebration on June 21. We wish to celebrate the diversity of cultures within the First Nations, Métis, and Inuit communities through whole school educational activities and our calls to action towards the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. This work will springboard us into the next year with many more opportunities of our students to deepen their learning and celebrate diverse cultures.

COSC meeting May 10/22

- 1. Transportation—John Blood, Director PSD, transportation
 - 7 within the department; customer service, dispatchers, planners
 - Dispatch 6-5:30; liaise with bus routes
 - 2-way radios on all buses
 - Parent hotline
 - Planners—verifying data after registration; routes made, refined
 - Now 155 routes up to 156 next year—a lot of logistics to get students on routes and get bus passes out, drivers to contact parents
 - Daily deal with misplaced students (wrong buses), parent inquiries, driver/contractor inquiries, complaints
 - Bus cancellation—monitoring weather; ie. storm predicted—early in am, will go out on road and assess—if whiteout conditions, then decision made with superintendent; sometimes if conditions poor in some areas, will cancel those routes and leave others running; don't always get it right; always try to decide by 6 am to give parents notice; difficult but balanced approach; extreme cold (minus 40) will cancel—can also cancel based on area; other conditions: fog, tornado
 - Routes—always try to keep pick-up on right side of road; look at congregated stops—a centralized stop; in country-- look at whether close to a bend, hill, can a vehicle see the lights when they're stopped (front or rear); will liaise with RCMP in certain conditions ie. 779 highway—there is a pick up on the highway—will issue tickets; will do public campaign
 - If an issue—ask parents to call; can follow bus, etc. to follow to ensure safe; bus drivers can also speak up if problematic stops
 - Try to keep 400-500 m from stops; 2.4 km is distance from government
 - The more stops you make, the longer the trip is—ie. especially in the country
 - Route planned based on the time has to be at the last school—drivers will run route and make more accurate timing
 - Receive money from AB government for any student over 2.4 km from designated school (major issue
 - AB Education makes the rules; PSD doesn't
 - Current funding review (distances, funding)—is gone to minister—how it will look...no one knows
 - Comment—App is fantastic
 - Province wide shortage of bus drivers
- 2. School Council Funding Options
 - Amber Muir Lake—many schools interested in pooling funds
 - Scott Johnston spoke with ASCA (Wendy). They can review governing documents; draft operating procedures; meet for 1 hour with each chair and principal to finalize documents
 - ASCA—AGM and conference—school councils can purchase sessions \$125 for all; \$60 for breakout sessions

- Book 2-hour operating procedures—can book into fall
- CFO---preference that things started and completed before Aug 31/22
- Can we pay this year and book in the fall? Sounded like yes, we can.
